Helping students develop confidence in History lessons

One important reason why students of all ages are both successful in and enjoy History lessons is that they understand how to learn effectively in History. This understanding depends on them receiving consistent and straightforward messages across the Key Stages about what 'doing history' involves and also about why it is worth studying. In addition, students need to be regularly engaged in reinforcing their chronological understanding and their overview of the past.

This keynote discusses these and other aspects of 'doing history' which help students of all ages see the links and connections between what they do in History within and across the Key Stages – as well as taking ten minutes to explain the history of Britain's involvement in warfare from the Romans to the present day.

The Devil is the Detail: How macro History can allow students to access links and connections






or – Workshop D


