Dr Alison Kitson is Associate Professor of Education at University College London and Programme Director of UCL's Centre for Climate Change and Sustainability Education.

Workshop A: Photography: Evidence and Ethics

This workshops explores how teachers can use photographs and develop students' ability to read them critically as evidence. This session will focus on photographs which depict mass violence, atrocities and genocide, and the ethics around their use in the classroom. **Secondary - KS4 and above**
